HAILS, FAREWELLS & HAPPENINGS

Greetings, Baylor Nation! Can you believe summer is upon us already? We have much to report this year, but I'd like to start with a remarkable story about three heroes in our midst. On the evening of April 17, 2013 three of our nursing students, Cadet 1st Lts Quianna A. Samuels, Alison R. Nordlander, and Ashlyn J. McNeely, had just finished their Air Force ROTC Leadership Laboratory requirements on the Baylor campus and were on their way back to the nursing school in Dallas. While stopped for dinner in West, Texas, a deafening blast shook the air and a mushroom cloud climbed into the evening sky: the result of a massive explosion at a fertilizer plant one mile away. The three immediately rushed to the site on foot and began pulling survivors from the rubble of destroyed buildings, triaging patients, rendering aid, gathering medical supplies and directing evacuation. They spent three hours on scene, putting their training to work and saving lives,





while their own health and safety remained threatened by continuing fires and toxic smoke. For their selfless actions all three received the AFROTC Gold Valor Award, the highest honor bestowed upon an AFROTC cadet. Quianna and Alison received their awards from the AFROTC SWR/CC, Col Mark Mattison, during their commissioning

ceremony in May, and Ashlyn will receive hers when she returns to the wing in the fall. We anticipate all three will be featured by the USAF Portraits in Courage program this fall. Congratulations, ladies. We are all extremely proud of you!




Finally, I must pass command and say goodbye myself, as we travel to Peterson AFB, CO. The detachment is in the very capable hands of Lt Col James "Jim"


Mission Complete

CADET ACTIVITIES

- ♦ Civil Air Patrol Award: C/4C Joshua Pravel received the General Carl A. Spaatz Award, the highest award in the CAP cadet program. Lt Gen Douglas Owens, AETC/CV, presented the award during a well-attended ceremony.
- Field Training: Sixteen of our sophomore cadets (84% in all) were selected for Field Training this summer. The competition for Field Training enrollment allocations was even greater than last year, resulting in a national selection rate of just 75%. The wing led a very strong FTP program this past year, so we're expecting some amazing performances from our soon-to-be POC cadets.
- → President's Cup, Texas Field Day, & Other Athletic Endeavors: Early in the year the wing set goals of improving overall fitness and avenging their losses in our annual interservice and inter-school competitions. They restructured PT around these goals and worked diligently towards success.



As is often the case, a well-laid and well-executed plan led directly to success. In November, the wing fielded a team for the **Great Brazos Relay**. Team "Bear Force" finished the 120-mile race from Independence to Waco in 17hrs 25 min 20 sec, good enough for 2nd place out of 12 teams.



In March, Air Force regained the **President's Cup**, narrowly defeating Army ROTC in a very spirited competition. Following this victory, 22 cadets and cadre tackled the **Bearathon**. Twelve were running in their first half-marathon. Of the 22 starters, 100% finished the race! Well done, Air Force!



In April we headed to UTSA, where ACW 810 bested every other AFROTC cadet wing in the state to win the Texas Field Day Competition for the 3rd time in the past 4 years.

In November, Lt Gen (ret) Derald Lary (Baylor '54) joined us for LLAB and spoke with the cadets about his extensive AF career, including his time as the AF IG. Baylor President Ken Starr even joined us for lunch!



Brig Gen (ret) Art Cameron was guest speaker for our Dining Out. A career Aircraft Maintenance Officer, now serving as Director of F-35 Sustainment Strategies, Gen Cameron thoroughly entertained the wing with stories of his career, and of his own days as a cadet at Northern Michigan.

CMSgt John Snow, Defense Media Activity SEA, stopped by Baylor to visit his son, but then joined us for LLAB. The Chief discussed the senior enlisted perspective, officer/enlisted relations, and changes to the AF over the past 30 years. It was extremely relevant information for budding officers.
